## From The Pastor

One of the events I look forward to each week is Wednesday night Bible study. It's a great midweek boost to my spirit. Generally there are about 10 of us who gather to study one or more of the scripture passages prescribed by the lectionary for the following Sunday (the passages are in the bulletin each week, and on the Worship page on our website). It is usually a lively discussion, full of questions and insights as we learn together. I appreciate individuals being honest in their questions, thoughts, interpretation, and even struggles with the texts we are studying. People feel comfortable saying they don't agree with some portions of the Bible without fear of being chastised for their lack of conviction or faith in doing so.

At the same time, many have shared how they have really grown in their faith as they have learned more and more about what the Bible means and how it applies to daily living. Often someone will say, "I never understood what Jesus (or the passage in general) meant until we studied it tonight." And our discussions often influence the direction of my sermon for Sunday. With greater understanding of scripture, there is a stronger foundation upon which we can build our faith, and develop as Christian disciples.

But another important component of our time together is the time we spend talking about how it is with our soul, to use John Wesley's phrase. Each person is invited to share what is happening in their lives — celebrations, concerns, family situations, highlights from the week, etc. It becomes a way in which we can encourage each other as a community of love and support. For example, one of the people who attends struggles with alcoholism. During a particularly difficult time for him, as he shared his frustration, discouragement and feeling of helplessness, all of us gathered around and laid hands on him, and then prayed for him. He left with a revived sense of confidence and determination having felt the power of the Spirit move in him as we prayed. Also, before our closing prayer, we exchange "name cards," and commit to praying for the person whose name we have throughout the week. We are then assured that at least one person is praying for us during the week.

The core process of making disciples of Jesus Christ is: Radical Hospitality, Passionate Worship, Faith Forming Relationships, Risk Taking Mission, and Extravagant Giving. Bible study is an important way relationships and faith develop and grow, and Christian disciples are rejuvenated in "walking the walk" throughout the week. Will you join us this Wednesday at 7 p.m.? No matter where you are in your faith journey, or how much (or little) you know about the Bible, there is room for you in the circle.

## From the Minister of Youth and Families

Dear Friends.

Churches all over the country will celebrate Children's Sabbath, created by Marian Wright Edelman's Children's Defense Fund, the weekend of October 18. New Life will celebrate in worship October 18 at 10:30 a.m. Join us to celebrate children and the great gifts they offer the world, their communities, and their families.

The presence of children at New Life UMC demonstrates that there is hope to bring greater peace, to reduce violence, to accept ALL people (thus reducing poverty, racism, sexism, discrimination against gays and lesbians, etc.). We work hard at New Life to model that kind of acceptance. Of course, the presence of children at New Life also shows children sleeping during worship, children hiding in the irresistible 'secret passage' to the choir loft, pounding on pianos, hiding behind the pulpit in the parlor, and various activities of irritation and concern to their pastors, parents, and adults around them!

Celebrating children's lives during Children's Sabbath events helps bridge the gap between children and adults; it presents the children in ways the adults don't often see them: leading worship by singing, reading poetry and scripture, and uniquely serving the congregation. As part of the Sabbath, the children will also lead the congregation and partners of New Life, primarily Indian Run UMC, in the 31<sup>st</sup> Annual Columbus CROP walk on October 11 (www.churchworldservice.org). This helps teach children compassion, the reality of the world around them, the importance of community service, and more.

At New Life, we see many examples of people working to protect children through tutoring and mentoring, Christian education, and participating in special church events. And, increasingly we see a culture of relationships strengthening between adults and children outside the church. A community centered on children is visible at New Life, and must be in every segment of the church and the world. A Christian life helps provide a foundation for a life of loving, learning, and serving.

Children's Sabbath also reminds us of the facts about children who aren't being protected. During a Children's Sabbath worship service at New Life, a child who lives in poverty three times lower than the federal poverty level stumbled on the word "poverty" when reading statistics. It was a painful moment of bitter irony and registered with adults who recognized the drastic need for improved education, reduction of poverty, and more.

What would a nation look like that protected and served children? What would a nation look like that taught ALL of its children to read so they can succeed in life? The church must lead the way! Here are some ways to do this at New Life UMC:

- Sunday (last), 3-5 p.m., "Sunday Family Dinner"
- Tuesdays, 6-8 p.m.: "Plugged In" tutoring/mentoring (K-12)
- Friday (4<sup>th</sup>), 6-8 p.m.: "Friday Night Live!"
- Saturday (1st), 10 a.m. -12:30 p.m.: "Super Saturday" sports/culture/fun event

## A Letter from Camp

Do you remember summer camp? The food? The smells? Your bunk? The other kids in your cabin? Being nervous when the week started and then sorry to see it end because you met so many friends? Waking up in the early morning and waiting for the day to begin? Crashing in your bed at night after a great day that seemed to last forever?

This summer two of our youth, **Nyree** and **Kendra Booker**, got the chance to experience summer camp at Lakeside, Ohio for one week in July. "Reachout Camp" for youth in Middle and High School with campers and staff from different parts of Ohio, is a United Methodist Church camp (<a href="http://reachoutcamp.com">http://reachoutcamp.com</a>. This year explored the Paul's characteristics of Christian living. The Bible verse was I Corinthians 13:13, and theme was "In Faith we Hope to Love."

Two other regulars from New Life were present as camp counselors for the week – **Jeremy Stenger** and myself. This was my sixth year as a staff member at Reachout. I began with the youth from Worthington UMC where **Heather Moyers** is the youth pastor.

I was nervous about our youth coming to camp. The other campers come from suburban and rural areas. I don't remember any campers from an urban environment. Would our youth fit in? Would they be accepted? Would they make friends?

A large part of camp involves an off-site mission project where campers interact with people in urban locations similar to the neighbors who are part of our outreach ministries. For suburban youth, this experience can be unsettling as they experience people they aren't use to. How would our youth, who routinely experience these things, react to this interaction that lasts just a short while? Would they take it seriously?

Our youth were in living groups with experienced counselors. They had morning devotions and nightly discussions of the day's activities. During free-time campers could explore Lakeside, play basketball, or go for a swim in the lake. On Sunday night, the first night of camp, **Nyree**, **Kendra** and I went to the Whistle Stop for ice cream. This was their first exposure to Lakeside. One of the first things they noticed was all of the bicycles on the lawns, none of them locked. "Why aren't they stolen?" they asked. Lakeside is a culture shock for everyone, but for someone coming from an urban environment, the change is enormous.

My hope was that each of them would make one friend before they left for their mission trip on Tuesday morning. On Monday evening, we went for ice cream at The Patio (I love ice cream...). **Nyree** wanted to bring a friend with him (no problem!), and when we got there, he asked to borrow my cell phone. He called his Mom, and the volume was turned up on my phone so we were able to hear her on the other end of the line. He asked his mother "What kind of fudge do you like, because I'm going to bring some home for you." This just about made my cry. Here he is, in the middle of utopia, with a new friend, and he wants to tell his mother he loves her. Camp is good. His mother was very moved.

During the rest of the week **Kendra** and **Nyree** made friends, and were sorry to leave at the end of the week. They can't wait to go back to camp next year. One of the nice things about camp is that it doesn't matter how rich you are, whether you're musically gifted, or if you're good at school or sports. It doesn't matter what grade you're in at school, or whether you're popular or not. All it takes to be accepted at camp is to be there. That's what it's like when you're near God. The only thing that matters is that you're near Him. That's also what I like about New Life – all that matters is that you are here. It's that simple.



Following Christ's call, we welcome and serve all.


The first step in this campaign is to place advertisements in local newspapers like the Short North Gazette, to tell our neighbors what goes on at New Life UMC.
