From The Pastor

At a recent conference, I heard Naomi Tutu, daughter of Desmond Tutu speak. The title of her lecture was, "Striving for Justice: Seeking Common Ground." She criticized people who communicate that they see everyone of all races and nationalities the same, without judgment or prejudice, by saying they are "color blind." She did so by talking about her mother who is an avid gardener. When her father won the Nobel Peace Prize a few years ago, they were living in New York City at the time. They made the trip home to Soweto, South Africa to celebrate with family and friends. It was a long trip, flying to London, and then to South Africa. After 18 hours of flying, they arrived to a large crowd waiting to welcome them home and have a celebration for this high honor he was being given. By the time they actually arrived at their home, everyone was exhausted. As the rest of the family headed for bed, her mother went directly to her garden, weeding and pruning. It had not been adequately cared for in her absence!

Ms. Tutu said, "Now if you walked into my mother's garden and said,' I don't see any colors,' you would make her so mad she'd kick you out of her garden!" She worked hard to grow different kinds of flowers of various colors. She intended that diversity of colors to be growing together. That's what made her garden beautiful. In the same way, God as our Creator has created each of us in God's own image, yet in great diversity. So if we were to say when looking at each other with different shades of skin, different features, etc., "I don't see color," God would be offended! God worked hard to create the diversity among us, and sees beauty in all of those differences among the human family. And, as Ms. Tutu stated, God wants us to look upon one another in all of our diversity, and see beauty and value in our differences. As we do, we grow together as a diverse human family.

That's what we strive for at New Life. We love, welcome and serve ALL people in the name of Jesus Christ — in all of our diversity. We pray for eyes to see the beauty and goodness in each person, in our various skin tones, features, languages, and accents. We pray that we can see the image of God in one another, and receive one another as members of the same family — God's family. And in doing so, we find that even in the wonderful reality of our diversity, we also share much in common. This is the basis of our relationships, our ministry, our purpose. This is how we begin to reflect the Reign of God in what we do, and in who we are as the human family, and the body of Christ. What we strive for at New Life, let us also strive for in the world, so that it too begins to show signs of the Reign of God.



THE FIFTH AVENUE MIRAGLE by Grea Allenby

The New Life Community Outreach board has been meeting to plan how best to further Christ's kingdom of love and light. One of the first things the board did was to take stock of what we currently do. The story we have to tell at New Life is staggering, truly a miracle. During the course of last year, we estimate that we have provided:

- 25,000 meals, 17,000 of which were served in our breakfast ministry.
- 30,000 sets of clothing, with 100 new visitors to our clothing ministry each month.
- 1800 medical examinations to 550 different patients.

Miracles occur whenever some part of heaven touches the earth. Miracles are things we can't explain, they just happen. On earth, we explain things by saying that "this" happened first, and then "that" happened next. But heaven is eternal and not bound by time. So, when heaven touches earth, things happen that can't be explained in the normal way. Do people believe because they have faith, or do they have faith because they believe? The answer is neither - they both come from heaven and are given to us at the same time, and we call this a miracle.

My favorite miracle in the Bible is the multiplication of the loaves in Matthew 14, where Jesus feeds the five thousand with five loaves of bread and two fish. I like this miracle because it reminds me of what happens every day at New Life. Jesus looks up to heaven, gives thanks, breaks the bread, and has the disciples distribute it to the people. Somehow, there is enough for everyone. How? Did the Holy Spirit prompt the people to add their own food? Did God physically multiply the food himself? Or, did the people need less because it came from Jesus? Who knows? It doesn't really matter because all the explanations begin and end with God.

How is it that New Life can be so productive in its breakfast, clothing and health care ministries? Is it due to our partner churches who provide their own resources? Is it because God energizes us when we work shoulder-to-shoulder with other Christians? Or, is it because we make do with less, knowing that we are living out Jesus' command to "feed my sheep." The answer, of course, is "Yes."

If you haven't experienced the miracle on 5th Avenue, please join us next Sunday. We are always in need of volunteers. Come to serve and stay to worship. The breakfast ministry begins at 6:30am, with breakfast served at 8:30am. Bible study at 9:30am and worship at 10:30am. See you soon!

At that time all activity was located in the current clothing room space

One lady at one table sorted the clothes and handed out pants and shoes to the men. **Connie** advanced from check-out to the "back room" where a few used towels, sheets, pillowcases and blankets were kept. At that time a few bars of soap and razors were available to be given; all clothing was used. Eventually new socks for men were added. **Connie** has delighted in seeing the clothing room grow in supplies, volunteers, space and neighbors served.

Possessing the talent of seeing a good bargain, **Connie** has always come laden with supplies for the clothing room: tooth brushes, aspirin, Q tips, deodorant, toboggan hats, to name a few. Often items had been broken down into packages for distribution from the Personals Room. Under **Connie's** influence her circle and Sunday School class became involved in giving donations and money. Her daughters, **Deb** and **Judy**, followed in their mother's footsteps and volunteered and/ or sought bargains to supply the Personals Room. The church rummage sale was also a source of needed items, especially men's pants, for our neighbors.

Sadly for us in the clothing room, **Connie** will no longer serve as an active volunteer but New Life will always remain close to her heart. She will be involved in promoting the ministry of New Life at Church of the Master and already has recruited **Dave** and **Sue Arter** to be liaisons. **Connie** will continue to use her talents as she serves quietly in the background at Church of the Master. Typical of her generous spirit is a new venture to be a bridge partner for a disabled friend confined to a nursing home.


