From The Pastor

Carol died recently. She had been homeless for a long time, but had finally moved into her own apartment, where she was found after her death. She attended Breakfast regularly for a number of years, always making an entrance in her own unique way. She wore lots of makeup, a long flowing wig, heels even in the coldest of days, and a BIG smile! When she came into the building, **Carol** would already have in her hand her weekly offering — change she had found on the sidewalks throughout the week — to give to me. Whatever fruits she gleaned she gave as a thank offering to God. For someone who didn't have many resources, this could be seen as a sacrifice, but for Carol it was a celebration that she had something to give.

The season of Lent is a time in which we give special attention to practicing the spiritual disciplines of fasting, studying scripture, prayer, celebrating the Eucharist, and spending time with the Christian community. These are all disciplines we practice throughout the year as disciples of Christ, but Lent is set aside as a season to be intentional about doing so in order to draw closer and renew our commitment to Jesus our Savior. We journey toward the cross, fully aware of the ultimate sacrifice Jesus made in dying for our sins, making available the gift of salvation and new life to all of us. And hopefully causing us to be prayerful in how we can respond in gratitude and love in sacrificial giving or serving. To be clear, the spiritual disciplines are not sacrifices, but means of being open to God's grace. And, they are a way in which we become more aware of ways to respond to that grace.

I was talking with a new volunteer in our health ministry recently. The pastor of his church, located on the campus of OSU has been challenging people to engage in "inconvenient" service. He is speaking mostly to college students, and 6:30 on Sunday morning is one of the most inconvenient times to be awake and actively serving! But, for those who volunteer in our early morning ministry, it's not an inconvenience at all. What might be more inconvenient is to do things that require sacrificing our comfort, our routines, or our long held assumptions. It could mean volunteering in a new way, for example in our breakfast ministry (Sunday or Tuesday), instead of making toast or scrambling eggs, move to the dining room and pour coffee, or sit down and talk with one of our neighbors. Or, get involved in our Friday afternoon ministry with kids, even if working with kids isn't necessarily "your thing." Looking beyond New Life, it could be a mission trip, getting involved in issues that impact our neighborhoods, our most vulnerable neighbors, and beyond. Whatever causes us to stretch beyond what we are comfortable doing, go the second or even third mile in our giving of time or resources, build relationships with people different from us, or is just generally inconvenient can become a different kind of spiritual discipline. And when we do so out of our love for Jesus, and gratitude for all he has done for us, it is far from a sacrifice — it is a celebration that we simply have something to give in return.

An additional leader is needed from 5:30 to 7:00...this leader would assist in the meal time, the transition period. They will assist in getting children ready to return home and to load on the bus. This person could also be a bus driver if they desired to do so.

A bus driver is needed to get the kids home. Take home is at 6:30...this is usually a 30 minute commitment.

Dinner Partner We have dinner prepared for the children by a number of individuals, however on the 1st Friday and the 5th Fridays, we still have openings for chefs. We usually have 15-20 who attend.

Training will be on Tuesday March 1st. Classes will begin Sunday the 6th and Tuesday the 8th.

New Sunday School Teacher Position 6 years and younger: We have openings for Sunday School Teachers. Currently we do not have anyone serving in this role; this could be a weekly commitment, or could be shared among 8 individuals. We also are looking for someone to help cover this spot for Children's Church. We have children who are currently not coming due to the lack of a teacher.

Ash Wednesday Service at King Ave UMC

We will join with our brothers and sisters in Christ from King Avenue United Methodist Churches for worship on **March 9 at 7 p.m.** The service will be held at King Ave. UMC, **with dinner served at 6 p.m.** If you would like to sing in the combined choir, see **Bob Brown**.

On Ash Wednesday we come to worship to kneel, to pray, and to ask God's forgiveness, surrounded by other sinners. We come with a "broken and contrite heart," in the words of Psalm 51. On this day, ashes are smeared on our foreheads, a symbol of our mortality, of our brokenness, of our sinfulness. The ashes are smeared on us in the shape of a cross, a reminder that through the death of Christ, we find forgiveness and the fullness of life. We will also receive the sacrament of Holy Communion, remembering that through Christ we are forgiven, set free from our sins, and filled with the Spirit which enables us to live as faithful disciples.

Ash Wednesday is the gateway to the season of Lent, a 6 week period in which we are very intentional in our spiritual disciplines of prayer, study of scripture, worship, fasting (as we are able), and self-denial. Make this a time for renewal in your faith and commitment to the Lord.

Faith Community, Shelter Board and Distpatch Partner in Campaign

As we know so well, Central Ohio residents are seeking emergency shelter in alarming numbers, swelling shelters beyond capacity, and impacting ministries who care for people who are homeless in significant ways. As one way to respond to this growing need, the Community Shelter Board held a fundraising entitled. "One Day to campaign Homelessness" which will support programs including homeless prevention and rapid re-housing. Sponsors of the campaign include WBNS and the Dispatch Media Group, along with the faith community, including The United Methodist Church.

On the WBNS/Dispatch website this month, a short media clip will appear communicating that *The United Methodist Church is working to end homelessness EVERY day.* There will then be a link to the United Methodist Community Ministries website, and ultimately to websites for churches and ministries such as ours, providing an opportunity for people to learn more and potentially volunteer or financially support the ministries of New Life.

Let there be light!! Or, how many United Methodists does it take to change lightbulbs?

In the Assembly Room where much ministry and fellowship takes place the old fluorescent bulbs were mostly burned out, and would soon need to be replaced with new ballasts and light bulbs.

The problem? The ceiling is at least 30 feet high, and inaccessible with anything but a floor lift.

We were blessed that ESP, Inc. loaned us their lift at no cost. The challenge was getting this 500 lb. piece of equipment into the building. The Lord blessed us with a strong, or at least determined, group of men — **Tom Poole**, who went to Grove City to get the lift, **Bill Casto**, **Brian McKnight**, **Mel Hampton and his friend Bill** — who hauled it off the truck and up the steps to the first floor (the hard part!).

The next day, **Tom Householder** and **Bill Casto** spent several hours changing the ballasts and the light tubes.

Now, the next challenge was getting this piece of equipment OUT of the building! But we were blessed again with another volunteer in our ministry who works for a company that MOVES HEAVY EQUIPMENT. They offered to help us with this task. We are very grateful for all of the men who worked to complete this task, and the good news is that the room is MUCH brighter.

So as **Cathy Brady** said as she watched **Bill** and **Tom** working, "it takes a whole VILLAGE" of men to change a light bulb at New Life.


